- *What is your alert?* **Vocabulary Development EL Kindergarten**
- *Why did you pick it?* Vocabulary is a huge part of Kindergarten, regardless of what my EL population is. All five year olds are learning the English language. I have 15 ELs in my classroom this year. One thing that I have noticed in my career is that EL strategies successfully work for all students. This topic is one that I can always improve in with my teaching.
- *How often is the alert being sent to you?* Daily
- *Will you be likely to use this in the future?* Yes, I believe I would.
- *What google alert topics can help you with teaching?* So far, I like the blogs and websites that have been found regarding early vocabulary lessons. I enjoy reading “How” others focus on teaching vocabulary. I can always improve my efficiency and effectiveness in this area.

I have a folder for each week of the course that contains discussion posts, assignments, and notes from the reading.

On Sunday night, I save the whole discussion in a PDF so I can refer back to it to see my classmates' opinions and suggestions about different types of technology that I may want to try in the future. (According to Canvas support, you should be able to do this by clicking the three dots at the top of the page; however, Canvas support said this function was turned off by UC Berkeley Extension. Instead you can right click on the discussion page, click "print," and then choose "save to PDF" in the destination box where you choose a printer. This will save your file as a PDF.)

3) Name **one thing that you learned in this course** that you will definitely use again.

I've enjoyed trying out different types of technology throughout this course and contemplating ways that I will use them in the classroom. One thing I will definitely use again is Google Lens, especially its translation function and ability to open websites just by pointing your camera at the web address.

Hi, Jennifer. Pronunciation for speakers of other languages trying to learn English is a challenge: I agree. One of the things that helped me teach first graders phonics is also understanding how the sound is formed. For example, Spanish speakers have a hard time with SH and CH sounds in words. Using body language while paying attention to what the lips and tongue are doing is extremely helpful. Think about the pronunciation of how it "feels like." Do the lips touch when saying a word? Is the tongue touching the teeth?

Google Alert

The Google Alert that I chose to set up was on the query “educational technology for K-12 classrooms.” I am beginning with very broad parameters because I’ve been out of the classroom for a year and a half and I feel I’ve lost touch with what is on the cutting edge. In setting up the search, I also became aware that the results cover issues and research related to remote learning. I think I will likely get a lot of results so I’ve set this up to be sent daily so I can read at my leisure as things come in. I’ve never set up a Google Alert and think this is a great resource. I like that I can curate my query once and then stay current. Ongoing professional development is crucial and this is a simple way to ensure it. I would add searches related to differentiated instruction and Universal Design for Learning as well. I have a special education background, and these are topics that are useful in that realm, but also add to good pedagogy in any setting.



I had been keeping my discussion posts as individual Word documents, for the most part, as I found it easier to type and then copy my responses into the text box on Canvas. These are all in a main "TESOL Technology" folder in Word. I have to admit, this folder has a lot of info in it, as I've also been creating documents with links and downloads for the specific topics we've covered in class. In order to compile my discussion posts and streamline the folder, I opened the grades tab and copied what I had written each week and then pasted it into a running document with the guidelines at the top. At this time, I am not saving classmates' posts just my comments on them. With that said, I think you've all been very inspiring. You've helped me see things a little differently and more creatively:-)

Gems From This Course

This class has been chock full of great ideas. I was an election worker and I was able to work with two voters who did not speak English because I pulled out my phone and used a translation app to get them started in the voting process. It felt amazing! I would have relied on a lot of gesturing otherwise. (FYI My county registrar provides video conferencing and telephone language support so my aim was truly just to get them comfortable and started in the process). The assignment that I think I would make use of right away is the picture assignment. I love how easy this is, and how it can be readily adapted to any age or level. When I first began teaching, I had a basket of laminated scenes from National Geographic magazines and calendars for my young students to use as journal prompts. This is an updated and more targeted way to build language skills. I can create the pictures on a class-by-class basis depending on what content is being covered or language structures I want to focus on. I think it would serve as a great springboard into a lesson or work just as easily as a closing activity.
